



Jill Brennan brought a Gonolobus (Matelea) cyclophyllus from Oaxaca. This member of the milkweed subfamily was in bloom.

I brought a mesemb (Mestoklema tuberosum) which I knew from one locality in Botswana. It forms small bushes with tuberous roots which are sometimes exposed by erosion in the wild. I bought it at the Palomar CSS show & Sale.

Polly brought a Kalanchoe prolifera which we had

seen in Malawi when we were in the Peace Corps. We thought it looked like a succulent walnut. This was purchased at the members' plant sale in Fresno.

Richard Rawlins brought a Bakersfield cactus which was producing new pads.

Lynn McDonald brought a Euphorbia fimbriata and an Echeveria nodulosa. The latter was in full bloom and had variegated leaves.

Jack Reynolds brought Dragons' nests (Euphorbia bougheyi) to give away. I took one for the brag table. This is a tree up to 7 m tall (21 feet) and is frost sensitive, so it probably will be hard to grow here. The top branches are flat, but it may form up to 5 ribs on the lower stem. It comes from Mozambique.

Incidentally, Polly's Stapelia was in full bloom on Monday, but perhaps it is just as well it didn't open for the show- the strong smell attracted lots of flies which laid lots of eggs!
